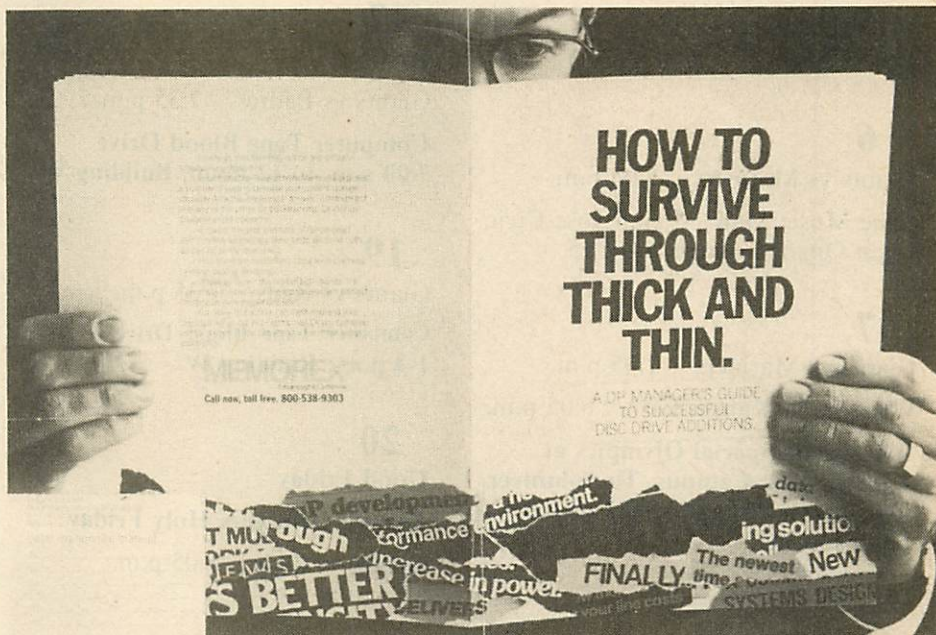
SEM&D employees meet "super-human" goals despite obstacles

Astec Corp. ships 2078/2051 monitors by Tom Dillon

The Communications Group recently received the first shipment of redesigned low-cost monitors from Astec Corporation in Taiwan for the 2078 2051 terminal lines. The new redesigned monitor from Astec enables the Communications Group to continue their cost reduction efforts and increase reliability on the 2078 and 2051 terminal lines.

The Communications Group and Astec entered into a development agreement in early 1983 for a redesigned monitor that comes complete with CRT, deflection board circuitry, and plastic enclosures.

First prototype units have been life-tested in Taiwan with favorable results to date. First production units are expected in mid-March and full production will begin in April.

Memorex dispatchers do much more than expedite

Dispatch is a word derived from French meaning "to expedite," and Memorex dispatchers do just that and much more. Memorex dispatchers primarily serve as liaison between the field customer engineers who maintain and repair Memorex products, and domestically-based Memorex customers.

To reach Memorex, the customer calls a toll-free number which is received by the Dispatch Center in Santa Clara's building 10. When a dispatcher receives a customer call (and after obtaining the customer's name, location, and equipment problem), they immediately contact the CE

assigned to that customer's area. It is the goal of the Dispatch Center to contact the CE within a maximum of one hour from the time the customer called or ideally, within 30 minutes.

If the primary on-call CE is not available or cannot be reached, the next attempt is to contact the CE's backup. If contact is not possible with the backup, the dispatcher calls a Memorex manager who, in turn, calls the customer.

Once the customer is contacted by Memorex personnel, and after the situation is evaluated and corrected, the CE again calls the Dispatch Center with the service call results.

Although the fundamental purpose of the Center is to relay messages from customers to CEs, other aspects are involved, as well. Center employees must maintain up-to-the-minute data on locations of all CEs, whether they're on or off duty. They must tabulate information on the shipment of parts and frequency of usage. They compile information on parts used on each job, time spent on-site, and other job-related data. All this information is logged for tabulation and future statistical use.

Besides required technical expertise, dispatchers must also have well-developed people skills. Dealing with an upset customer is all in a day's work for a Memorex dispatcher.

Currently, the Dispatch Center is in the midst of transition. From a total manual operation, the Center has implemented the Uniform Dispatch and Data Collection (UDDC) program. With the UDDC program, the Center's efficiency level will increase while operating costs decrease. The computerized system will enable dispatchers to quickly call up on their terminals: equipment history, spare part locations, and available CEs in adjacent areas. This type of on-line information will benefit the CE and Memorex customers by ensuring that situation evaluation can be accomplished more quickly and smoothly.

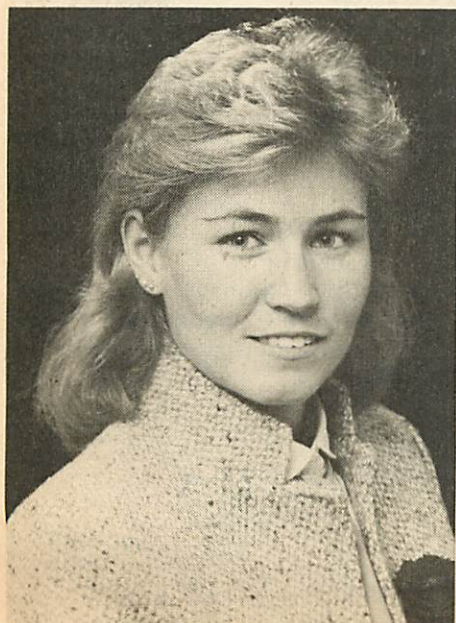
Dispatcher of the Month named

Singleton has been with Memorex for two years, is a senior dispatcher, and serves as chairperson for the day shift problem-solving group called "The Talking Heads."

Lynch, like Singleton, is also a senior dispatcher and serves as the chairperson of the off-shift problem-solving group named "The Red-Eyed Grave Swingers." Lynch has been a Memorex employee for nine months.

And balancing books, as they put it, is only half the job. The credit department personnel are continuously seeking new ways to make their job easier, yet more efficient.

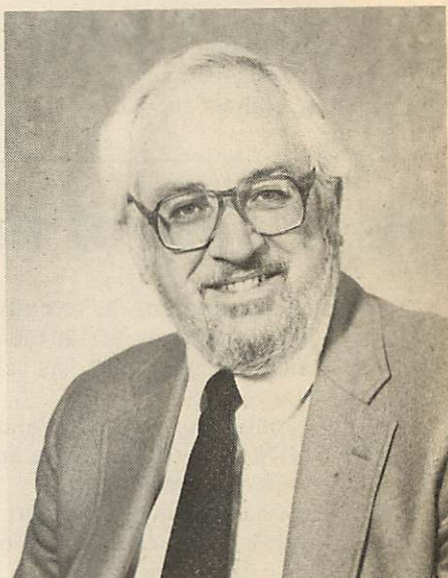

J.A. marks 30 years in County with variety of programs for h.s. students

The Junior Achievement (J.A.) Program in Santa Clara County is in its 30th year and has undergone many changes in that time. Memorex has been a supporter for a number of years. The high school program, which was the initial J.A. concept, is one of several programs providing economic education to students in our County. The following describes the various programs provided by Junior Achievement:

JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT — The traditional high school program is best known. It is founded on the concept that students "learn by doing." Students in the high school program work with business advisors provided by Memorex and other local companies to form and operate their own small business enterprise. 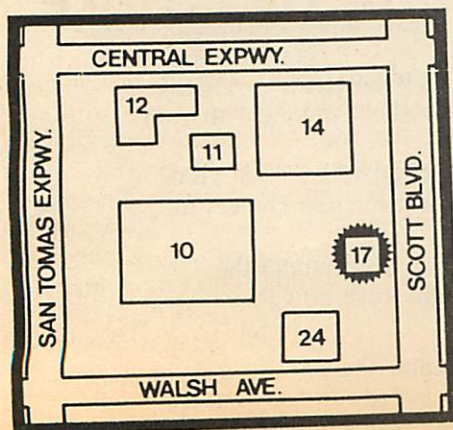
The building has been renovated to accommodate both groups and will

United Way offers advice on IRS charitable contribution deductions

If you're like 70 percent of this country's taxpayers, you don't itemize on your income tax return. That means you haven't been able to deduct any charitable contributions.

That's all been changed now thanks to the 1981 Tax Act, which allows non-itemizers the benefit of a charitable contribution deduction. Last year only 25 percent of eligible

taxpayers took advantage of the new tax break. The surprisingly small number who used the deduction has been attributed to a lack of awareness.

Following the deduction's less than successful debut in 1982, proponents have worked hard to make sure eligible taxpayers are informed of the incentive and make full use of it when preparing their 1983 returns. The unique deduction is the only major adjustment on the new 11-line "1040 EZ" tax form.

For 1983, non-itemizers can deduct up to \$25 or one-fourth of their contributions up to \$100; for 1984, the maximum deduction will be \$75 (one-fourth of contributions up to \$300) and in 1985, one-half of contributions are deductible, with no dollar limit. In 1986, non-itemizers will be able to deduct all of their charitable gifts.

After the 1986 tax year, the non-itemizer deduction provision is slated to terminate unless it is extended. An extension takes an Act of Congress, and that takes public support. Taxpayers must show how important the charitable deduction is by using it, or they will lose it.

It's been 20 years since the first Memorex staff accountant joined the Company and today, **PETER AYE**, that first accountant, is still a Memorex employee.

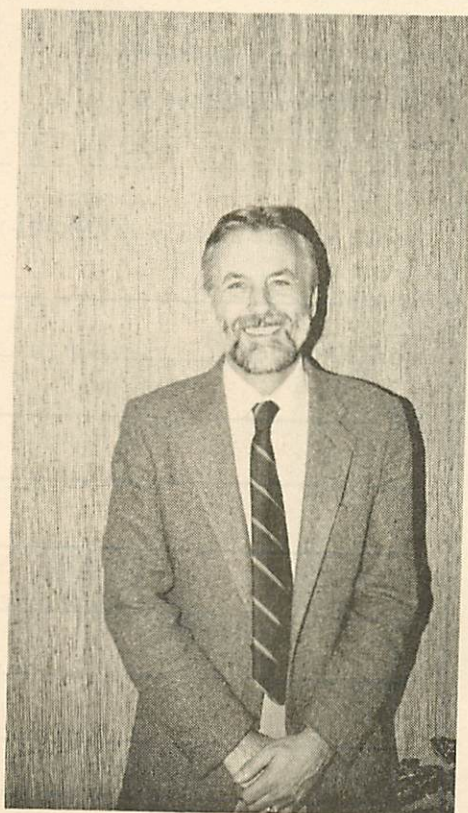
