



being enlarged so that there will be more outdoor eating space.





The Flying Twenty Club, San Jose State's flying club, will hold its third annual Airlift the weekend of April 18th and 19th, from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. The purpose of the Airlift is to acquaint more people with the fun and safety of flying.

The Airlift will be held at the San Jose State Department of Aeronautics, located at the San Jose Municipal Airport (corner of Coleman and Airport Blvd, across from FMC). The Airlift rate for a ride around the valley is 2¢ a pound. (For example, if you weigh 155 lbs., your ride would cost \$3.10.) This event is fully sanctioned by the Federal Aviation Agency, and only commercial pilots will be used to fly the aircraft.

In conjunction with the Airlift, the Flying Twenty Club is holding an Open House at the SJS Department of Aeronautics. This facility is nationally famous as one of the best in the field of aviation. Guides will be there to offer information and answer questions. There will be continuous showings of aviation movies covering everything from the Apollo Moon Shot to learning-to-fly. The highlight of the Open House is a ground display of the "world of aviation," with more than a million dollars worth of aircraft. Along with the latest-production Pipers, Beeches, and Cessnas.

About every six months, MAG sponsors a blood drive in conjunction with the Red Cross. The next one is on April 6th, from 1:00 to 4:30 in the afternoon, and on the morning of April 7th, from 7 to 9, in the cafeteria on Shulman. The Equipment Group will hold a separate drive later in the year, when space becomes available for this type of project.

The team took the 1969 National Inter-collegiate Championship in competition at St. Louis University and Southeastern State University. Harry Brandt, a Memorex foreman, was named Top Male Pilot at the meet. The competition is sponsored by the 114 colleges and universities of the National Intercollegiate Flying Association and is attended by many of the major schools in the nation. During the past four years, the San Jose State Team has won the National Championship three times (1966, 1968, 1969), posting the finest record of victories in the 22-year history of the Association.
